























**Upcoming Board Meeting**

## IT'S NOT A KIMONO, IT'S A HAP'PI COAT

For all of us who are not certain of the spelling, meaning, or pronunciation of those funny jackets frequently worn by kiters, I offer the following information. As provided by The American Heritage Dictionary: the correct spelling is hap'pi coat, which is pronounced "happy coat." I've often seen two common misspellings of this word: "hopi" - which is actually the name of a southwest Indian tribe, and "hapi" - apparently an unauthorized shortening of the word. A hap'pi coat is: "A Japanese lounging jacket with wide, loose sleeves and often an overlapping front closure usually tied with a sash."

I recently found a neat book entitled "Make Your Own Japanese Clothes" by John Marshall. There, I learned that the hap'pi coat is actually a version of a hanten jacket, an informal jacket worn over a kimono. According to the book, a hanten may come in a variety of lengths and sleeve shapes "so that it can be designed to suit the job at hand." A hanten can be lined or unlined. Commonly, the hanten has a cone-shaped sleeve, but it can have various types of sleeves, depending on the use for which it is intended. Pockets may be added to any hanten.

The hanten version used by kiters is the workmen's hanten, which is usually unlined, has tube sleeves, and is worn with a cloth band around the hips. These coats are favored by traditional craftsmen and by "laborers, gardeners, carpenters, fisherman, firemen, and farmers," among others.

Families and companies often print the hanten with their names, in Chinese, "vertically on both sides of the collar and emblazon [their] crest on the center back of the jacket." In other words, they use them like our kite groups use T-shirts to identify the group and/or event.

According to the book, the thing that turns a hanten into a hap'pi coat is that the coat is shortened and made out of a festive, brightly colored cotton fabric. Many of the hap'pi coats seen on
local beaches are made out of material which

features kites and clouds. Some have hand-painted designs. A talented Oregon kiter, Barb Wright, painted many of the special hap pi coats seen in Washington and Oregon.

Finally, do not confuse the wearing apparel described above with the traditional hap'pi coat kite, called a Yatko. That kite was designed to look like the wearable coat. You can find plans for this kite on the worldwide web.

For those who are interested in making their own hap'pi coat, please note: DO NOT USE A KI-MONO PATTERN - IT IS DIFFERENT! Barb Wright has taught classes in making the coats and has a great pattern. If anyone else has a pattern to share with club members, please do so! If all else fails, the book listed above has a pattern, but it is not quite as simple and straight forward as Barb's. Susie says to tell you that she likes to have a matching doggie carrier and hat.

So, the next time you want to know what to wear to a Washington kiting event (besides a rain-proof jacket and umbrella-the only suitable attire for this year's "Beat the Bowls" event on January I,) the proper answer is, of course, a hap'pi coat. So, either get out the sewing machine or save your pennies to stuff the raffle bags next summer in the hope of winning this highly desirable article of clothing.

The cost of \$80 will cover all materials and expenses. Participants need to bring sewing machines, thread and cutting tools.

#### A Vernal Equinox Creation March 22 - 23

Leigh Blakey and Lee Taylor bring fabric painting instruction to this kite design and kite-making workshop. Each participant will learn resist and fabric painting techniques while decorating a 28" X 28" kite skin with 3 sets of dramatic ripstop tails. Lee says this can easily be done in the two days plus time to fly a bit. All materials will be provided. Besides the sewing machines, thread, etc. each person needs to prepare the kite tails before they come, if possible. Three colors of ripstop are recommended. Make one 15' and two 10' tails of each of the three colors, all 3 " before hemming. Choose colors you'd like to use in your kite. Cost is \$30.00. Visit web site geocities.com/two\_lees.

#### HISTORY OF THE WKA BANNER

Before our current logo was designed, someone did sew up a banner that showed WKA on it in the colors of green and yellow. The club logo at that time used those colors. But that banner did not catch on and no more were made because the colors did not show up very well. (Information from Jean Sisson.) In 1992 the Washington Kitefliers Association held a contest to design a new club logo. The winner of the design contest was announced at the WSIKF Pizza Party that year. Jeffrey Reed submitted the winning design. This was also announced in the August-September 1992 WKA newsletter.

The new WKA logo was shown flying on banners at WSIKF that year. They were made by Dave Christenson and Julie Gantt. Both banners showed the 3-color diamond kite logo (just as it appears on the membership card) on a white background. Dave's was a rectangular flag and Julie's was sewn as a feather banner, not as long as our current banner. (Pictured on page 3 of the October-November 1992 issue.)

Excerpts from WKA Board Meeting Notes by Bob Alford:

At the Fort Worden Kitemakers Conference in 1993 several board members talked to Carla Fox about the possibility of her producing a WKA banner design that she could make as kits to be sewn by the membership. She had mailed four or five suggested designs for approval. The board unanimously selected one and ordered 20 kits. The banners are 12 ft. long, and utilize the colors of the logo. When production lines get fired up, the kits will be available to the membership. (June-July 1993 issue)

The banners that have been completed are beginning to get noticed at events and beaches. The initial order from Carla has already been sold. The price of the kits is \$42. The consensus of the ones that have

sewn them so far is they are big, wonderful, and worth the effort and cost. After the discussion and display of the banners, the board decided to order twenty more of them from Carla. An ad and photo of the banner appeared in the newsletter. "Kits by Carla Fox containing precut material and instructions to sew a 12' WKA banner, \$42 each. Make check payable to the WKA. Contact Susie Christenson...." (August-September 1993 issue)

The idea of getting our organization recognized at functions and events led to a lengthy discussion about our new banners and whether we should buy banners for displays. After discussing inventory control and such, we decided to purchase two banners for the WKA. [no other information on where they went] (October-November 1993 issue)

Advertisements for the banner kits appeared in the newsletters at the price of \$42 until December 1994-January 1995 when the price was dropped to \$35. The sale of banners must have slowed down. The banners were advertised until October-November 1997. No wonder that the club had a lot of money tied up with a total of 40 that were ordered. The first 20 kits must have gone to active members, and the other 20 took a very long time to get sold. This brings us almost up to current times.

I purchased the last kit that Susie had in her inventory when I realized that they would all be gone and I would not have one to display at events. I held onto that kit for awhile until someone said that he would make up a pattern so that more banner kits could be made.

Time passed and the kit moved from kitemaker to kitemaker without anything more done with it. Then a couple of years ago I happened to see an

artist at the Bellevue Arts & Crafts Fair with a sign saying "Carla Fox." I found out that this was the same Carla Fox who had made up our banner kits. Because the project was in limbo, I asked if she still had the original patterns or more information on the kits. She replied that she still had them in storage. I requested that she keep in touch and when they could be located, to send them to me, which she agreed to do. After another year the original paper patterns and the very last kit she had were shipped to me.

These paper pattern pieces and instructions and extra kit, plus the one that I purchased, have again gone from hand to hand and now reside with Mary Bos of Cutting Edge Kites. She is quoting a price of \$60 for a kit, or \$100 sewn. Orders will be taken soon.


