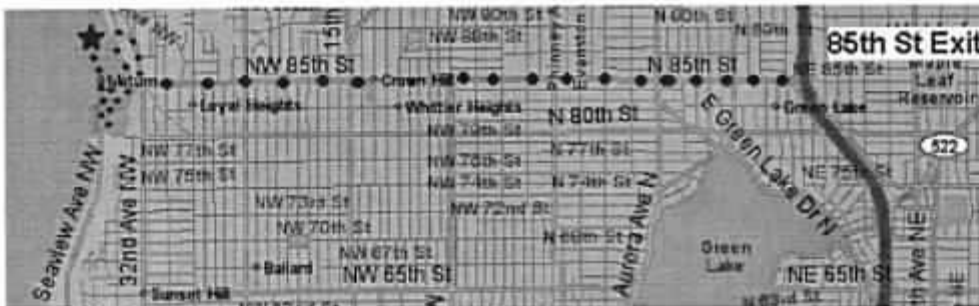

Fort Worden 2005

Who *doesn't* want to have a kite that is personal, unique, and flies well? If that describes you, then skip to another article. If you *would* like to have one or more kites that are personal, unique, and fly(ies) well, keep reading here.

The 22nd Annual Ft. Worden Kitemakers Conference will take place 4, 5, & 6 March, 2005. The first thing I want to say is you don't have to actually *be* a kitemaker before you come the first time, but you probably will leave as a proud kitemaker, with your own kite made with your own hands. In other words, don't be afraid to come. You will do just fine.

That said, let me try to describe what I like about Ft. Worden: The people are friendly, helpful, and won't laugh at beginners. The location is beautiful, set in a long-retired coastal artillery fort at Port Townsend, Washington. The price of the conference includes meals and rooms (room & board, if you prefer) and your registration. Day trippers are welcome (for a small fee). If you'd rather bring the motor home or camp out there is a great campground. Since Washington State runs the entire place, the accommodations are good.

Okay, so it's a nice place: what about the kites? Well, there will be 21 different instructors teaching more than twenty-one different kites. Your problem will be to choose what you want to make and sort out possible schedule conflicts. A lot of the students (especially when they are new) will try to do as many kites as the schedule will allow. I've learned from experience that it is better (at least for me) to concentrate on one or two larger projects and use the rest of the time to schmooze (a kiting technical term for picking the brains of everyone else there).

This year's conference will feature John Freeman's *Lepidopterus Freemanicus* (Freeman's Moth) (a kite my wife has lusted after for a couple of years now), Dan Kurahashi's Simple Edo, and an awesome collection of other kites. If your sewing skills are as poor as mine, you might consider Sam Huston's No-Sew Diamond Roller, which is assembled with an industrial strength adhesive. (And it holds up, too!) Not to be left out, Brooks Leffler will teach how to build a Kite Aerial Photography rig, teach you how it should be used, and put on a slide show of samples of aerial photography that is delightful.

Deb Cooley will teach a class on Yard Wrigglers, which, while they don't fly, are eye-catching things to amuse you when the winds are too light to lift a kite. And remember, if you sew like I do (or *don't*, really) you can take Gerry Pennel's class on how to sew kites and learn all kinds of useful techniques and skills (and those skills apply elsewhere, too).

I'll be there. Just look for the big white hat on a short, fat old hippy. Oh, and if you can show up on Thursday, 03 March, you get to participate in the open house and get acquainted session. It makes a wonderful way to kick off the weekend!

Dear Kite Enthusiast,

You may be a devoted member of the World Kite Museum, a professional kite flyer or a weekend kite warrior chasing the perfect wind or a rookie. We even admit that some of you may be surprised that there is a Museum for Kites! It doesn't matter which camp you fall in. What does matter is that kites are important to you!

I want you to remember 2005, because it may be the most important year ever in the world of kiting. That's because the "new" World Kite Museum will open in 2005. Did you know that this Museum is the only kite museum in North America? We've operated for 16 years, but finally we can take our place as a "world-class" Museum. And that's why I'm writing you now. We need your help and financial support.

First a little history—The World Kite Museum & Hall of Fame began modestly in 1988. Organized by a group of local kite enthusiasts and kite nuts, the Museum quickly took flight and grew steadily over the years. We acquired a collection of 1,500 kites from around the world and an extensive archive of print materials, photos, videos, oral history tapes and slides. We also created numerous kite exhibits, kite-making workshops, special events and multicultural celebrations throughout the country. Last year, we reached 100,000 people through our programs. In short, the World Kite Museum has grown every which way except in space. After 16 years, we're still operating within a tiny cottage on the Long Beach Peninsula.

Our Capital Campaign Goal is \$1,000,000—To-date, we've raised \$800,000 of our goal from major State and Foundation grants, the Museum building fund and from individual donations, including the Museum's Board of Directors. This means we are nearly at our goal, which will cover the purchase of a 10,360 square foot building, the cost of renovation and funding for new exhibits.

As a member of the International Kiting Community, your support is critical to the campaign's success. Every donation—large and small—is very important to the Museum. We would love to have every kite flyer represented on our Recognition Wall, which will be on view to all future visitors to the World Kite Museum. For larger contributions, we offer special naming opportunities. Just imagine the thrill of seeing "your name or kite club's name" attached to the Grand Exhibit Hall, Education Center or Archival/Library. We are also planning a permanent slide show program in the new Museum, which will be available to Museum visitors.

Please join us in Creating a Legacy for the Future and help insure that the art, history, science and fun of kiting will live on.

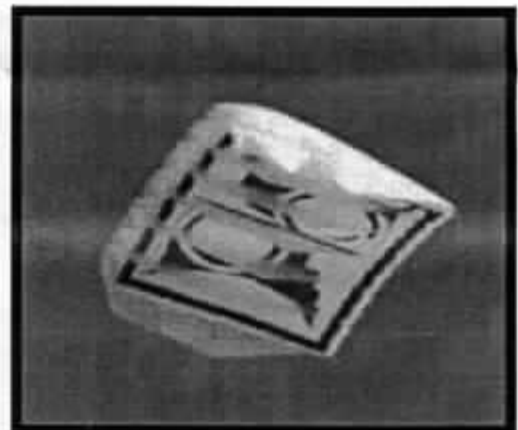

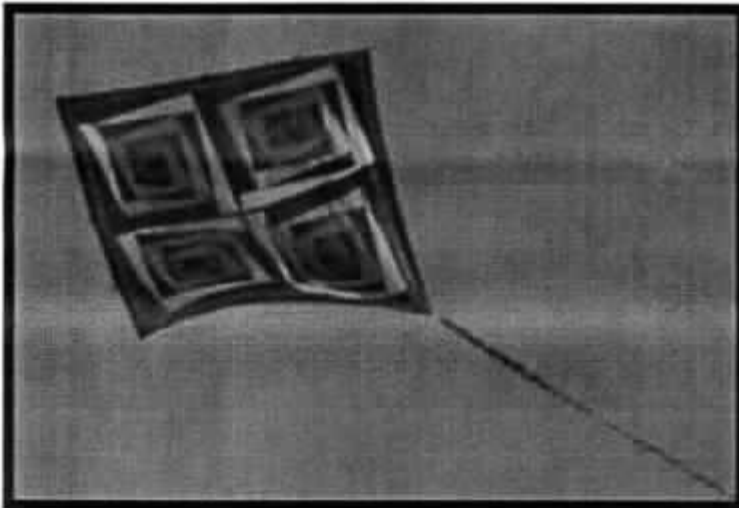
