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Plan Now for the Kid's Day Events at WSIKF by Glenda Kleppin

This is it. The final reminder of the "Kid's Day" events planned for Wednesday at WSIKF. I know that I've reminded everybody several times about the "Foster Grandparent Fun Fly". But I also want to remind you that we need lots more entries this year in the "Kid's Camp" and the "Group of Kid's Kites/Displays" categories.

So often we plan our displays to impress other adults. As I've said before, I learned this lesson all too well when my daughter brought my grandchildren (ages 4-14) to the event a few years ago and pointed out that—with the exception of the morning Children's Events and the Kitemaking Tent—there really was not much on the beach to hold their attention. She pointed out that most of the displays were too adult-oriented and most of the kites were being flown by adults. There was not much that the kids could walk up to and touch and few people interested in taking the time to talk to them about kites, much less show them how to fly one. My grandchildren voted with their feet by opting to go downtown shopping after they made their kites.

Based on my experiences when instructing preschool teachers (in one of my many career incarnations), I began my quest to make my own kite displays more "kid friendly." Some thoughts I had were: make things smaller; use images from children's literature and movies; and try to imagine the display from the perspective of someone only 36" tall. I also tried to think of new ways to get kids flying kites properly instead of running around in circles with them (as they all too frequently do after kitemaking workshops). This became my basis for designing and judging the Kid's Day events.

Why a "Foster Grandparent's Fly"? When I first started attending WSIKF, the Wednesday events were targeted at kids and people over 50. For that reason, I decided that I wanted to combine the two age groups as I had done with preschool groups by using the "Foster Grandparent Program", which is now a part of Senior Corps. According to their website: "Foster Grandparents serve as mentors, tutors, and caregivers for at-risk children and youth with special needs through a variety of community organizations, including schools, hospitals, drug treatment facilities, correctional institutions, and Head Start and day-care centers. In fiscal year 2001 more than 30,000 Foster Grandparents tended to the needs of 275,000 young children and teenagers."

The theory behind the program was that parents are often too busy with meeting the everyday needs of life for kids, while Grandparents more often have time to actually play with the kids (or join them in their own second childhood). That perfectly described what I envisioned for this event-adults and kids playing together as equals.

The members of the kite community have succeeded in recovering their wonder of the simple joy of making and flying kites. Now it is time to pass this wonder on to the youngsters who will eventually take our places. Please join me in attempting to draw kids into the excitement and creativity of the sport of flying kites.

If you are one of our newer members, you might not be aware of the Fort Worden Kitemakers Conference. If you are interested in the opportunity to take classes in making kites, this conference is a great place to learn all about it. This scholarship was named for one of our Founding Fathers, Tom Sisson, who wanted everyone to have the Fort Worden Experience.

This Conference is held annually in March at the Fort Worden Conference Center in Port Townsend. For three days there are many classes to choose from for simple or more elaborate designs. The classes are taught by local, national and international experts that share their knowledge, and some great kite stories too in their classes.

The wind, while a bit squirrelly now and again, was from the west and was just right for everything from the kid's kites up through the five foot square twisted log cabin quilt pattern kites from John Freeman's class. I even saw some flexi-foils. One had a guy airborne for a huge jump. The picture of that is on the WKA website. On the Lake Washington waters were a couple of huge power kites pulling people on surfboards.

Glenda had sent notices to every news outlet we could think of, but only a cameraman from channel 5 arrived. He spent nearly an hour filming kids and dads flying, showing the family nature of the event.

The WKA set up a headquarters under the awning of the motorhome and Sylvia Bernauer did a brisk business signing up new members, greeting people, and talking about kiting. She wasn't alone under the awning: Glenda and Susie held court as well. It seems there was a major level dog show in another area of Magnusson Park but many people with dogs couldn't find it and came clear out to where we were. We met some very nice dogs and convinced more than one owner to stop and fly a kite.

One group that stopped at the HQ was from a Cancer Survivors organization. They talked about using fly fishing to help people regain use of their muscles and Glenda suggested kite flying: Have them start with single line and then move onto stunt kites after their strength was built up.

While we set up the HQ, David Ellis, from Kansas, showed up. He was in town for family business and since it couldn't wait until August so he could do WSIKF he looked at the events schedule and chose the one planned for Father's Day here. We had met him at Ft. Worden and we were delighted to see him again. He brought an entire suitcase full of kites, mostly soft, and had a great time.

We brought out the bubble makers, too. We've found many kinds of powered bubble makers and set several up for the crowd's amusement. While we were playing with the BIG bubble makers the cameraman from King 5 TV showed up and shot about five minutes of various bubbles flying around. He was having almost as much fun as we were.

Ken and Suzanne had their usual Make a Kite booth and kept very busy all day. There were many delightfully decorated kites produced and flown. Occasionally one would escape into the trees and one even made it all the way to the water and kept flying as it dragged its' line holder through the water. I think it may have gone clear across the lake if it avoided the boaters.

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Speaking of water, Alan Fossum told of going swimming to try to catch a kite that got away. He got too tired to keep chasing it, swam back to the swimming platform and successfully recruited some paddle boat people to recover it. They had a terrible time paddling against the wind on returning from the rescue. Alan said he had visions of the kite rescue turning into a people rescue...

There were a couple of train wrecks. Ken Conrad had his beautiful long train up along side Rick White's delightful but shorter one. The wind kept dipping them toward the trees and I was worried about tangles. That didn't happen, but one of the twisted log cabins and a kid's kite got tangled and took out Rick's train. During the recovery operation the line broke so Rick pulled it all down for repairs. Rick also spent much of the day running around and taking pictures. He took about fifty and put many on the website

The Westport Windriders showed up with a trailer full of kites and picnic supplies. Other than getting tired from going up and down the hill, they had a great time and added much to the airborne display.

It was a great Father's Day Fly. Thanks to all the people who made it happen, from the permit process to the final clean-up. We'll see you next year!



Time and wind and surf and sun A healing, natural blend, They cleanse my heart, my mind, my soul My life is on the mend.


