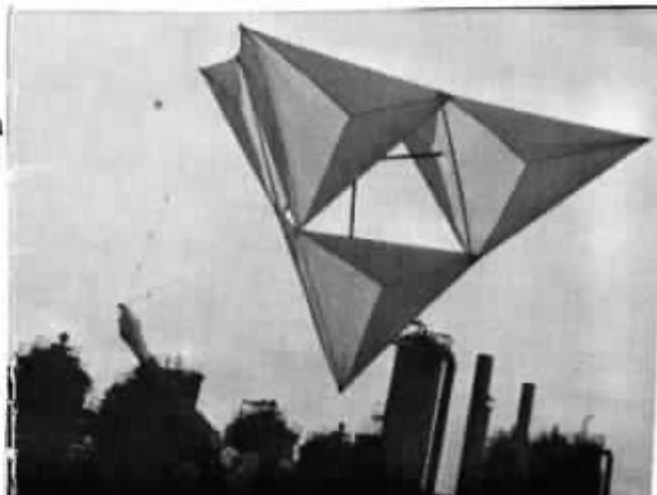

### GREGER'S OWL

George Greger answered our call for pictures with this owl kite that "I sewed from ripstop nylon scraps, and made it for those 'no wind' days when most kites won't stay up. It's a delta-coyne version but also making use of some techniques used by hang gliders to get more lift surface by use of battens on the trailing edge to stiffen the fabric into a lifting surface. The frame is two 4', 3/16" dowels with a rerun slot in the leading edge for them to slide into. I also put light bamboo strips into the leading edge of the triangle body boxes to keep the wind from distorting them.

I'm enjoying this bird because he has such an interesting effect on any gulls near by. They promptly get out of sight when this big owl goes up. It is a fun kite. A good addition to my growing collection of bird kites."

Jack Van Gilder has gone to Stevens school and Brighton school to teach kite making classes...says he is a real sucker for those beautiful thank you letters the children write!

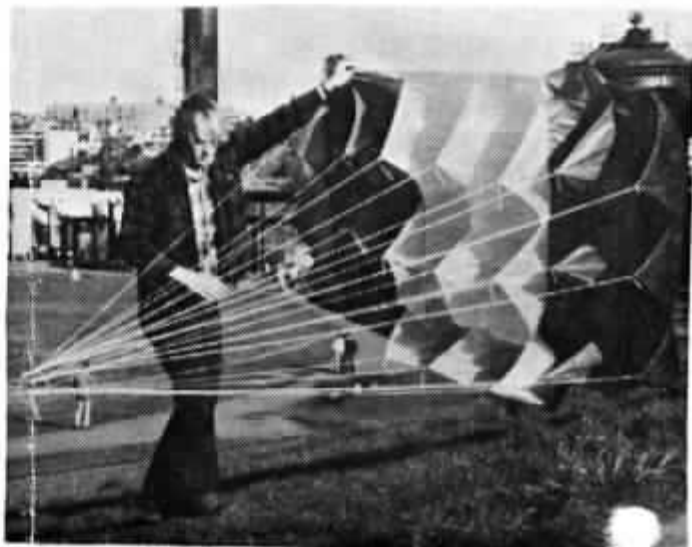

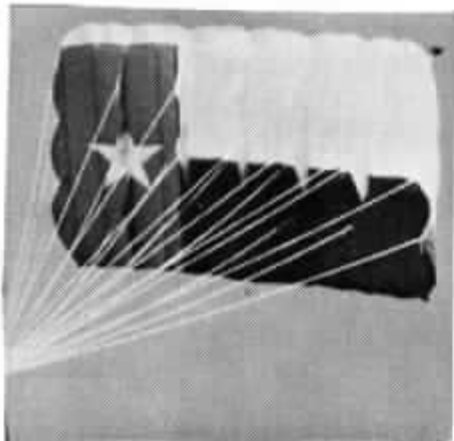

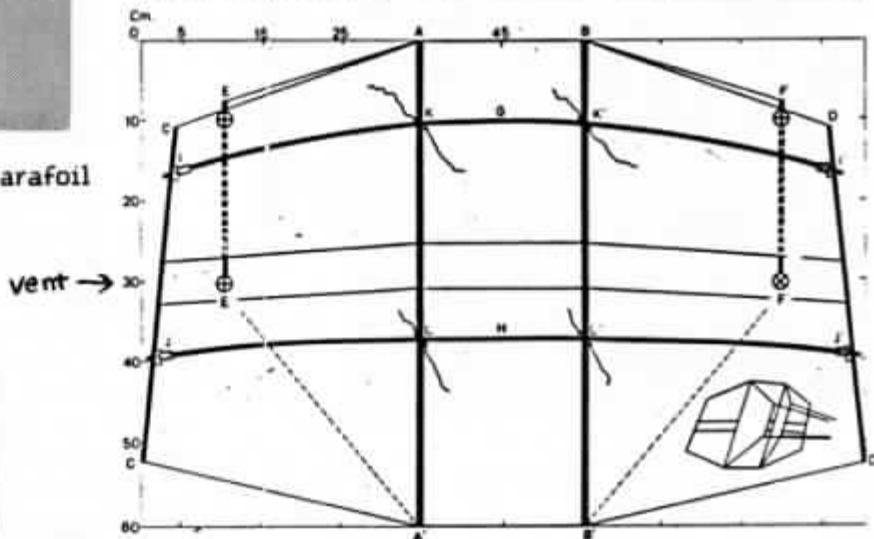
Doug Hagaman's Texas Star parafoil

## T. NISHIBAYASHI'S

Translated by A. Brandt  
 DOUBLE WING KITE



**Material** Cedar, pine, spruce AA' & BB' 2mm x 5mm x 60cm.  
 Bamboo CC' & DD' 2mm x 42cm.  
 Bamboo EE' & FF' 2mm x 23cm.  
 Bamboo or fiberglass G 3mm x 84cm.  
 Bamboo or fiberglass H 3mm x 87cm.

**Spreader bar fittings** Spreader bars are fitted into corresponding holes at J,J',I,I'. These holes are reinforced with taped down cloth patches made of either teflon or of nylon, 1cm x 3cm. Holes are made through these areas as fittings for the stoppered spreader bars.

**Fittings for K,K',L,L'** Cut four lengths of string 15cm long. Make two diagonally oriented holes on either side of A & B at K,K',L,L' in order to tie these stick intersections as indicated on the plan.

**Covering** The kite may be covered with either ripstop nylon or with high density polyethylene.
