## **LET'S ALL BE KIDS ON WEDNESDAY**

Don't forget about the WKA sponsored "Kids for Today" events on Wednesday at WSIKF - Glenda Kleppin and Susie, Empress of the Universe, Field Directors

Events #1 and #2: All day, everywhere (*Judging from 2:00-4:00 p.m.*)  
Event #3: Field B 1:00-2:00 p.m.

Registration: 10:00 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. at registration tent.

Ribbons will be awarded by WSIKF and certificates will be awarded by WKA for the top four(4) entrants in each event.

### **Event #1 is "Best Kids' Camp"**

Join with your friends or work alone to and set up a camp display that appeals specifically to kids. You may display current characters like Brother Bear, Nemo; Pirates; or Harry Potter, or you may want to highlight other themes.

Kids like things they can touch and see up close and they love learning about the history of kites; how to make kites; and how to identify the different kinds of kites. You will earn extra points if you have educational displays and/or actual kite making activities taking place at your camp. Let's get kids hooked on something good while they are young and impressionable.

There are rumors that there will be clowns, face painting, and bubbles to attract the kids to one of the camps. Use your creativity for this event and surprise us all.

### **Event #2 is "Best Group of Kids' Kites"**

Not enough time, energy, or stuff to set up a whole camp? Then just come up with a display of at least six items that especially appeal to kids. Again, there will be extra points if you have an interactive and/or educational display for the children.

### **Event #3 is "Foster Grandparent Fun Fly" (*Field B 1:00-2:00 p.m.*)**

This event is similar to a Mass Ascension with a few extra twists. All flying must be done in "grandparent/grandchild" groups (a "grandparent" accompanied by one or more "grandchildren"). The "grandparents" will provide a kite to give to the children. You do not need your own grandchild for this event. In fact, you are encouraged to "adopt" one or more "foster grandchildren" from the audience. Some people are planning to "adopt" several grandchildren, thus earning extra points.

The prizes for the "foster grandchildren" are the kites that the "grandparents" will give them and the fact that they will learn how to fly the kites.

The prizes for the "grandparents" are WKA pins for the first 100 registered; a special pin, designed by Jack Judd to be awarded to the "top ten" grandparents; and WSIKF ribbons for the top 4. Points will be based on all of the kites being flown by the grandparent/grandchildren units and on how well the grandparent is encouraging their "grandchild".

Lets all work together to make this a special day for the many children who come to view our kites. That way we can all be "kids for a day".

## August 15, 2004 - - Pre-WSIKF Historical Kite Fly

The Sunday before WSIKF will be a special kite-flying event to coincide with visits to the Peninsula of relatives of all members of the Lewis & Clark Corps of Discovery. To show these folks the kinds of kites flown at the Lewis & Clark Exposition in 1904, the Museum invites you to fly any of the following list flown at that event.

- And if anyone can find a plan for a three-foot-six-inch aeroplane kite flown by William King of St. Louis you'll get a special prize.

If you fly for two hours or more from 11 am to 3 pm, you will get a special pin. A prize will be given for the person flying the most kites and the person best impersonating the inventor of the kites he flies.

Other firsts at the 1904 World's Fair were ice cream cones and hot dogs with mustard. If anyone has those kinds of kites they will count also! Join us for the fun.

## Rich Miller, our friend and inspiration



*We were all saddened to learn of the sudden death of this dear member of our kite family on June 24, 2004. In addition to his beloved wife Evonne, he is survived by his parents, his two brothers, his sister, his 4 stepchildren (Terry, Jon, Heather and Katie) and his two granddaughters (Jenna and Hallie).*

*On July 2, 2004, at Grace Community Church in Elma, his various families (biological, work, and kite) came together to celebrate his life. Many tributes to Rich were read, punctuated by chuckles and sniffing from the members of the standing-room-only crowd.*

*His brothers filled us in on the facts and statistics of his life. Richard James Miller was a local boy, born on March 21, 1954 in Aberdeen. He graduated from Washington State University with a degree in political science in 1976.*

*His brothers described him as not just the oldest child, but also as the leader of their little gang through out their lives, both at play and at work.*

*They told of his skills in building and flying kites; building and riding mountain bikes; as the family photographer; and how he always cooked for 70. They told of his work in his father's logging business; as a popular beauty supplies salesman; as a truck dispatcher; and as a self-taught computer expert or knowledge engineer.*

*Evonne talked of their life together with eloquence and humor. She described him as her friend, her soul mate, her lover, her dance partner, and her husband, someone who gave her strength and inspiration. She drew a picture of him in his life as a father, a grandfather, and as a person who lived swing dancing and renaissance fairs. We all laughed when she described how he first met her four children when she dropped them all at his place on Halloween and how he gallantly rose to the occasion. She told of the time the sheriff had caught them in a parked car in the woods, found out that they were married, and told them to "go home." They explained to him that they couldn't because they had four teenagers at home. She described their seven years working together to make the Washington State International Kite Festival a success with Rich acting as Evonne's alarm clock, provider of coffee, mechanic, announcer, and general go-fer.*



*Rich was repeatedly referred to as the first employee and the prime person responsible for starting and making a success of SafeHarbor Technology Corporation. That company, according to their website, provides customer support services including web-based self service and email and telephone support to citizens, businesses and employees in the State, and employs over 200 people.*

*For Jerry and I, Rich is the first person we met from the kiting community when, as newcomers to the State of Washington, we wandered into the Ocean Shores kite festival one bright June Saturday in 1999. We had both flown kites, both as children and as adults, but had no idea that there were actually festivals of kitefliers. We immediately headed to the Cutting Edge Kite Shop to buy, buy, buy. Rich had invited us to the potluck and he and Evonne spent a good part of the evening explaining to us about different kites and other things we needed to know in order to enjoy our new addiction. The next day, we put up our things on the beach right next to Rich, and he patiently spent part of that Sunday explaining to us how to fly the stuff we had purchased, how to stay out of the way of other kites, and the many things we needed to know as "newbies."*

*Dave Christenson said about him: "Rich was one of those that didn't have to be told to do things around a festival. If setting up or taking down the fields needed done he just went out and did it, nobody had to ask him it just got done. I didn't get to fly with him very much but he always was willing to talk about kites etc."*

*After the service, Rick White, the WSIKF Cody Fly Coordinator had the following to say about him: "I thought I knew Rich Miller pretty well. It turns out, I didn't know him as well as I thought I did. All that stuff about dancing swing! Wow, that conjures up pictures! I didn't even know he danced. I didn't know he rode mountain bikes either. Again, Wow! The one thing I know for sure was he loved Cody kites! And I am not just saying that because of my job at the WSIKF. He really did. He told me his Codys were his favorite type of kites. That really meant a lot to me because they are my favorite as well.*

*"I knew he was a very busy guy with his work during the day, and at home. The WSIKF was supposed to be a vacation from it all, but it was a lot of work too. He was faithful in getting to the sound tent early every morning, that is right after he woke up Evonne with a morning kiss. And as we found out, that would be just before he ducked!*

*"Just like everyone at the celebration said, he was very even tempered. He never (almost never) lost his cool. I remember the only time I saw him lose it, was this last year when about 30 of the Cody flyers did not get a Cody pin, including Rich. Boy, was he steamed at me. I told you he took his Cody's seriously! Although it was entirely my fault, Launny gave him his own pin, then he was back to the cool Rich we all knew.*

*"I will miss him terribly. I already do!"*

*I think that Rick's sentiments are echoed by the rest of the kite family. There is little left to add, except to leave you with this:*
